SYNOPSIS

My Brilliant Career by Miles Franklin Adapted for the stage by Kendall Feaver

In rural New South Wales, 1899, Sybylla Melvyn is a force of nature—a young woman of spirit, born in the wrong time and place, but filled with dreams. Will she be a writer? An actor? An artist, a musician, a politician? Will she explore the world? Any one of these would be better than the path of wife and mother seemingly predestined for her. Determined to outrun the odds, Sybylla must contend with the expectations of society, the disappointments of family, and the beating of her own heart.

This new adaptation of Miles Franklin's classic My Brilliant Career by Kendall Feaver (The Almighty Sometimes, Wherever She Wanders) is dark, funny and urgent. More than a century later, Sybylla's voice is one that still demands to be heard—a guttural cry of rage against the inequalities set at birth. A one-two punch of success, a play that breathes fresh life into the original novel, while still feeling as relevant as ever.—Australian Book Review

FEES and MEMBERSHIP

There is a one-off Participation Fee of \$60 to participate as a cast member in My Brilliant Career which covers costs such as scripts, costumes, refreshments etc.

Cast members may require a current Working with Children Check.

REHEARSALS

Cast rehearsals will be held on Wednesdays 6.30-8.30pm and Sundays 10am-1pm.

Upon cast finalisation a comprehensive rehearsal schedule will be provided. Rehearsals will be at TOAD Hall, corner Manifold and Princess Street Warrnambool.

Cast may not be required for all sessions but will be allocated specific times, where attendance is required.

If you have any concerns about your ability to fit in with this schedule, please discuss with the Producers. Any absences that you are already aware of (e.g. a booked holiday) should be listed on your audition form.

Please note, by accepting a role in this production, you are committing to rehearsals as scheduled. Please show your respect for the production team and your fellow cast members by advising the Directorial team of your absence as soon as possible.

All cast must be available for production week, technical and dress rehearsals

CALL BACK AUDITIONS

Those who receive a call back will be asked to perform alternate scenes for a particular character, which will be given on the day. Call backs may not occur for every role.

CASTING

My Brilliant Career includes 22 characters. There are a variety of roles for performers all requiring strong acting skills.

All shows must be performed, so we will be seeking two actors to play Sybylla (one being an alternate who will perform in at least one show and more if required due to illness or injury). There will be understudies made up of existing cast members for other characters who would only perform if required.

The playwright has asked that casting for all future productions continues to reflect the diversity of modern day Australia. Character ages are flexible and all actors of any age, ability and cultural background are encouraged to audition.

My Brilliant Career cast is comprised of the following characters:

Character	Role	Info
Sybylla Melvyn	Lead	Age 10, 15 but mostly 19. Sybylla is the lead character and protagonist. She is deeply ambitious, angry and strident but playful and provocative. An imperfect heroine. A wonderful opportunity for a strong actor who can show determination and vulnerability.

Harold 'Harry' Beecham	Secondary	Sybylla's 'love interest'. Owner of Five-Bob Downs. An admirable figure in squatter society, wealthy and accustomed to the congenial ways of country life. A layered character; stoic and controlled, yet tender and considerate.
Lucy Melvyn	Secondary	Sybylla's mother. A multifaceted character embodying the struggles of a woman who holds on to the vestiges of her aristocratic background while facing the harsh realities of life in poverty. The anguish and frustration of her circumstances are palpable.
Grannie Bossier	Secondary	Sybylla's grandmother. Lucy's mother. Grannie Bossier holds a position of influence and respectability at the Caddagat estate, maintaining a strict adherence to propriety and advocating for marriage as the primary and most fitting aspiration for young women.
Aunt Helen	Secondary	Sybylla's aunt. Lucy's sister. A figure of nobility, compassion, and domestic talent. Helen's personality reflects a response to her past heartbreak. However, Aunt Helen's experience of love and loss does not stifle her capacity for affection, particularly toward Sybylla.
Uncle Julius John 'Jay Jay' Bossier	Secondary	Sybylla's uncle. Lucy's brother. A large, jovial bachelor of forty well-regarded across a wide region in Australia. His character is one of good humor and generosity, encapsulating the archetype of the affable and unattached gentleman
Frank Hawden	Secondary	Employed as Overseer at Caddagat. A rather fickle and persistent character who vacillates in his opinion of Sybylla and eventually becomes infatuated with her. Frank serves as a representation of a social construct that Sybylla challenges.
Aunt Augusta 'Gussie' Beecham	Secondary	Harry's Aunt. She invites Sybylla to visit Five-Bob, thinking her a good match for Harry.
Mr McSwat	Secondary	Patriarch of a rural and unpolished family who comes into Sybylla's life due to a financial arrangement with her father. A simple, utilitarian man concerned primarily with immediate farm and rural life.
Mrs McSwat	Secondary	A contrast to the other female characters, defined by her lack of refinement and a life steeped in mundane rural responsibilities.
Richard Melvyn	Tertiary	Sybylla's father. Characterised by his descent from admired family patriarch and aspiring entrepreneur to a defeated alcoholic. His decline impacts his family's fortunes and ultimately shapes Sybylla's circumstances.
Horace Melvyn	Tertiary	Sybylla's younger brother.
Mary O'Farrell	Tertiary	The Bossier's Irish housemaid at Caddagat.
Peter McSwat Jr	Tertiary	The eldest McSwat child Peter is in his late teens to early twenties. His parents have high hopes for his prospects of marrying a local girl, Suzie, and continuing the family business. He is intrigued by Sybylla and shows her kindness.

Lizer McSwat	Tertiary	One of the McSwat children.
Gertie Melvyn	Minor	Sybylla's younger sister. She is an embodiment of the idealised young femininity of the time. Contrasting with Sybylla's fiery, independent nature, Gertie is depicted as pretty, girlish, and full of innocent charm. She appeals to society's standards with her more conventional and demure demeanor.
Midwife	Minor	Lucy's midwife.
Blanche Derrick	Minor	A beautiful woman who visits Harry at Five-Bob with a view to marry him.
Jimmy, Tommy, Rose Jane and Katie McSwat	Minor	The McSwat children range in age and could be played by adults. They are cheeky, obstinate, and refuse to do anything that Sybylla tells them to.
